## The Campaign to Replace our Organ and Renew the Nave

#### The Organ

Since late last year the organ builders at Taylor and Boody have been building our organ and they continue to do so. Soon after Christmas Taylor and Boody will begin the two-month process of installing the organ and doing all the things necessary to get it ready to play. If it seems like we started this process years ago....well, we did!

#### The Balcony

From the beginning we have known that we need to make some changes in the balcony to prepare it for the new organ. That work will begin in mid-June and will include the removal of the current organ and the old asbestos tile flooring. Significant work on the bellows room behind the organ is required. The balcony will be a construction project from June until the organ is installed early next year.

As needed the balcony will enclosed in plastic. Obviously this work will require significant adjustments by our choir and musicians. We will not have an organ until the new one is ready but will use our wonderful grand piano in the interim.

### The Current Organ

Early in the balcony project the Zimmer organ will be removed. For those who would like to retain a momento of the Zimmer organ, all the pipes will be placed somewhere (to be determined), and parishioners can help fund the new organ by buying some of the pipes from the Zimmer. Details on the "pipe sale" will be shared as the work schedule shapes up.

#### **Finances**

We have restored our original heart pine floor, replaced lighting controls and improved lighting, refurbished and refinished the pews, repaired and reinforced the ceiling, insulated the attic, painted the walls and trim and improved the lighting of the altar window. Soon, at last, the new organ will be here. So, where do we stand financially?

None of the Sacred Sound and Space work would have been possible without the generosity of our parishioners. Once the organ has been installed, we will have completed more than \$1,500,000.00 in improvements in The Nave. Assuming pledges come in as scheduled, and assuming the work in the balcony comes in on budget, we still need to raise at least \$65,000.00. ## Stephen Ministers Installation

Today, Sunday, June 4th, at the ten o'clock service we will commission four new Stephen Ministers. We are also celebrating the recommissioning of nine currently serving Stephen Ministers. For the past five months this group of thirteen dedicated members of our congregation has studied, learned, opened their hearts, and journeyed together, creating community along the way.

Stephen Ministers are trained to provide high-quality, one-to-one, Christ-centered care to people in the congrega-



tion and the community experiencing life difficulties. This requires deep compassion and empathy, as well as a willingness to deepen their own self-reflection and personal relationship with God. The Stephen Ministers at Christ Church have done this and continue to do this as they go forth to do the work God has called them to do.

Training to become a Stephen Minister takes fifty-five hours, and our dedicated group took this seriously. We received generous training help from Becky Gaeta and Perry Bosmajian. We would particularly like to extend gratitude and appreciation to Barbara Bornemann who co-facilitated the Stephen Ministry training.

# Celebrate World Refugee Day with Interfaith Refugee Ministry

World Refugee Day was first celebrated on June 20, 2001, to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the 1951 Convention Relating to the Status of Refugees. On June 20th, World Refugee Day, we celebrate refugees' contributions to our community and seek to build empathy and understanding for their plight and their resilience to build a bright future.

How many refugees does the U.S. settle each year? Less than ½ of 1% of the world's refugee population of nearly 32.5 million (2023) is settled in the U.S. each year. For 2022, that number was 24,465. As of the end of April, 24,823 refugees have arrived in the U.S. since October 1, 2022. Interfaith Refugee Ministry (IRM) has received 87 individuals in the same time frame and expects to reach 165 by the end of September.

Where do refugees in Eastern NC come from? It depends on the world situation and on IRM's capacity. Refugees are assigned to Interfaith by Episcopal Migration Ministries which considers many factors such as language availability, affordable housing and availability of employment. Between 2020 and 2023, IRM has received refugees from Colombia, Burma, the Democratic Republic of Congo, and Central America.

Thank you to all of you who continue to provide IRM with life's necessities for incoming refugees. We are very grateful for your support. Currently, we are not accepting any clothing. If you have furniture to donate and need a pickup, please call.

## Updates from All Saints ECW

Christ Church Episcopal Church Women (ECW) had a very successful Geranium Sale and will be splitting the proceeds (\$840.00) by donating \$420.00 each to local nonprofit organizations, *Laundry Love* and *My Big Dream*.

*Laundry Love* (https://www.facebook.com/LaundryLoveofNew-Bern) provides local laundromat space twice a month for folks in need to come in and do their laundry for free. They provide detergent, fabric softener and other essentials. Also, they have activities for the kids who come with their parents! As of April they have been able to serve 747 local families and wash 6,530 loads of laundry.

My Big Dream (https://www.mybigdream.us/) is a fairly new group (founded in 2021) that works with individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, such as Autism and Down Syndrome. Their mission is to create beautiful products with hope, love and inclusion. They craft objects (mugs and reusable gift bags, to name a few) and sell them at Pop-Up shops around the area.

We are very proud to be able to help these two wonderful 501C charities, and we thank you for your support!

We had a wonderful day to end out the ECW year with a picnic in Glenburnie Park in May. We are looking forward to September and a new year when we will have interesting speakers and trips lined up. Please join us then!

Both the General Convention of The Episcopal Church and the Executive Council have regularly reaffirmed these stances since they were first adopted in 1976 (Resolutions 1976-A069 and 1976-A071).

June is known as Pride Month and began as a commemoration of the long and continuing struggle for LGBTQ+ rights in our country. Those successes and struggles continue in faith communities around the world, too. Let us pray for all those whose full humanity as a beloved child of God is not yet recognized by others.
