# Stewardship Story: Nancy Mansfield

Joe and I are both professional fundraisers. We believe in giving. We give.

Both of us grew up in Christian families where giving was encouraged but pledging was not a part of our church experiences. We came to the Episcopal Church as adults, and one of the things we learned is that Episcopalians are expected to pledge. I honestly don't know how we decided how much to pledge in the past. I think we just decided on what we thought was an appropriate amount and signed the card. Done.

Something wonderful happened to us when we were living in Buffalo and active in St. Paul's Cathedral there. Joe got elected to the vestry. He went to his first meeting and came home with what has proven to be a life altering challenge. All of the Vestry there agreed to sign a pledge to work towards the tithe.

Like all of you, we knew what a tithe was—10 percent of your income. So, we, admittedly for the first time in our lives, sat down and looked at our giving. How much did we give and what percentage of our income was that?

It was not a happy answer. Even when you factored in all our charitable giving, not just to the church, we were way short of the tithe. Us generous folks were not so generous after all. We needed to do better!

Now here's the happy part of this saga — when we decided to look honestly at our stewardship, we were troubled. But when we started to do something about it, a wonderful change happened. We put our money where our mouth was, and we came to understand that what the Bible tells us is true — Where your treasure is, there will your heart be. We became cheerful givers!

As tithing became a permanent part of our lives, little by little we grew spiritually. We increased our stewardship of time and talent as well as treasure.

I encourage you to take a clear look at your stewardship. The little brochure you got in the mail offers some easy ways to approach your giving. Most of all I encourage you to let tithing be a joyful goal not a burden. In other words, don't give until it hurts — give until it feels good! As we remain grounded in faith, we will grow to serve.

# Stewardship Story: Joanie Bogle

When we were asked to chair the Christ Church stewardship campaign, I was pretty uncertain we had the qualifications and background to do it. We are fairly new to Christ Church and to being Episcopalians. And, believe it or not, until several years ago, we were even new to the idea of church stewardship and pledging!

Let me explain. Randy and I grew up going to church with our families in Illinois — he at Vine Street Christian Church and I at St. John's Lutheran. We both went to Sunday School and put our little white envelopes in the offering basket. And though we knew we were offering our thanks for God's blessings, the idea of pledging and stewardship were never mentioned.

As adults, we moved every two years or so with our young family while Randy pursued his career in the Navy. We'd no sooner settle on a church and get the kids into Sunday School, than we'd pack up and move again. Somehow, we missed the part about pledging and stewardship. In our last few Navy postings, we attended Navy chapels. Pledging? Stewardship? No. That never came up.

After Randy's retirement from the Navy, we moved near a small town east of San Diego and joined its little community church. The church was so small that nearly all of us held church board and committee positions, usually more than once. It was then we realized there was more required than participation alone and dropping an envelope into the plate

The church has bills to pay? Salaries and benefits and insurance? Maintenance and loan payments? Costs associated with the volunteer ministries the church supported? And these are paid by the congregation through pledging rather than by some synod or diocese?

I know that sounds very naïve, but now that we understand, we've come to embrace the idea of church stewardship in all its forms. We've come to realize that being part of this or any other church congregation means a commitment to stewardship to help it thrive and grow. Better still, we've come to realize how good that commitment feels in our hearts and how it lifts our spirits to outwardly give back the love God bestows on us.

One of my favorite Christian authors said we are not reservoirs, but rivers. The love and blessings we receive from God aren't stored in the reservoir of our hearts, but rather flow freely and joyfully through us and out to others. Pledging our time, talent, and financial support is both a spiritual and tangible way to let that love flow through us -- and through Christ Church -- to each other and to the community.
