Joining us for today's Camp Hope Sunday is Buddy Payne, Camp Trinity's Associate Camp Director. Please join our Camp Hope volunteers during coffee hour in welcoming Buddy back to Christ Church.

#### Camp Hope's History

Jane Merritt founded Camp Hope in 2006. Camp Hope is a free overnight summer camp for children (ages 8-13) with an incarcerated or released parent or step-parent. Camp Hope has served hundreds of children from New Bern and across the state. From 2006 until 2019, Camp Bob at Kanuga hosted Camp Hope. For the past two years, YMCA Camp Harrison in Wilkes County hosted Camp Hope. One of the unique features of Camp Hope was that all of the children attending the camp week had been impacted by incarceration. Another special feature of Camp Hope was that adult volunteers from Christ Church went with the kids to camp, chaperoning them on the bus and assisting the camp counselors with supervision. This provided an opportunity for mentorship and a meaningful part of this ministry for our volunteers and campers.

#### Why is Camp Hope Changing?

Camp Bob and YMCA Camp Harrison can no longer offer Camp Hope a special week of camp. Therefore, we had to start thinking about Camp Hope differently. What are the most important parts of this ministry? What is most important to the children and families we serve? With all the changes since COVID, how do we offer stability and sustainability to this ministry?

We are excited that Camp Trinity is our new partner. Camp Trinity



cannot offer our campers a special session with adult volunteers. Instead, our campers will attend a Camp Trinity camp session that best fits their schedule and be around more campers their age. We can now provide summer camp to more campers because Camp Trinity serves teens up to age 18. Camp Trinity offers a slightly longer camp session than YMCA Camp Harrison at a lower cost. We think our campers will enjoy all the activities and special religious programming Camp Trinity provides. Camp Trinity also gives swim lessons to elementary and middle school campers, which is important given the number of Camp Hope campers who still need to learn how to swim. Lastly, we are excited to share that we have contacted our GIG families and



# ORGAN UPDATE

### Better Than It Has to Be

When I became the new Music Director at the Somers Congregational Church in Connecticut right out of college, the last thing I expected was to delve into the world of organ building and acoustics. Then, about three years into the position, a devastating fire completely destroyed the old meetinghouse, along with the organ inside, leaving nothing but ashes and a church with a long road of rebuilding ahead.

Our motto for inspiration was *The church is the people, not the building*. However, it soon became clear how important the building was to people. After an initial period of shock, questions emerged, such as "*What* about the building matters most to you?" At first, folks were mostly concerned about visual components: what would the new church look like, would it be exactly the same as the old one? Then they began asking different questions: what is more important in the church service, sound or sight? The answer to this question quickly became "sound," which included being able to hear the sermon, the scripture readings, and ... the music.

An organ committee was formed, and members suddenly found themselves immersed in the vast world of organ building. They were tasked with the responsibility of finding and selecting an organ building company to build the new instrument. I became one of the main advisors and leaders of this team. Most of my responsibility fell on education and exposure. None of the members of the committee were musicians, let alone organists. The committee had many questions. What constitutes a "good" organ and why would one builder be better than another? What types of organs even exist? Which instrument is best for our church, which builder? We planned trips. I took the committee to many different cities around New England, visiting organs and talking with other organists. It was quite an educational experience for everyone!

After months of deliberation and (often heated) debate, the committee decided on a tracker organ and signed a contract with the Richards & Fowkes builders in Tennessee, a company very similar to Taylor & Boody. Richards & Fowkes, like Taylor & Boody, is known for building instruments of the highest quality. The Somers church was thrilled they had settled on this builder. An acoustician was also hired to work with the organ builders. As we all know, the space or room that the organ sits in is an essential part of the instrument; it is, undeniably, a fundamental part of the sound of the organ.

Once the building process began, we ran into something that anyone who has hired builders to build anything has experienced: delays. There were construction delays on the actual church building, often having to do with materials and contractors, delays with the architect working with the acoustician working with

the structural engineer, and delays from making sure everything was "up to code" (the three most dreaded words).

Finally, there were delays in the organ building process itself. Richards & Fowkes were constructing an organ with a detached console for the first time. There were complications with the trackers that were to run from the console to the organ. Detached consoles are notoriously more complicated to build; the keyboards and pedals are not directly connected to the instrument. Tracker organs are mechanical, which means there are actual wooden pieces that connect the keys mechanically to the pipes, as opposed to an electrical signal that tells the pipes to speak. This affects the action, or weight, of the keys.

Taylor & Boody, like Richards & Fowkes, have been facing delays in the construction of our Opus 85. Three main construction complications have been the cause: 1) the fact that the gallery, or balcony, is extremely small for how large of an instrument Op. 85 is; 2) constructing the inpost (or base on which the pipes sit) has been extremely challenging because of its very large width (a wider organ was necessary because of height restrictions in the gallery); and 3) the round tower moldings have proved to be an unexpected challenge, as the carvings themselves are round and need to look uniform (they are being carved by hand).

In addition to these challenges, the pandemic has created some major setbacks and general delays. There was another project in front of Op. 85 that caused our start date to be delayed. Perhaps it should come as no surprise that construction delays from the pandemic have also affected organ builders!

At this point, most of the organ has been built, most of the pipes have been made, and the overall shape of the instrument is coming together. The builders are focused on our project, and they're working very hard this very moment to complete it.

Our group of folks from Christ Church are excited to visit the shop this month and see the progress. The builders will certainly be in the midst of putting the organ together, and they are hoping to hold an open house at the shop (when anyone can come visit and see the organ) to showcase the completion of the organ in late April. Our current estimated delivery date is sometime in the beginning of June, or possibly earlier.

Taylor & Boody is known for building extremely high-quality instruments and are one of the best builders in the whole world. Myself and other organists affectionately refer to Taylor & Boody as the "Rolls-Royce of organs"! Their instruments are in every way a work of art. The motto in the shop is "Better than it has to be," which says a lot about who these builders are. There is no doubt in my mind that Taylor & Boody will deliver a spectacular instrument and one that is worth waiting for.

# Follow-up from Annual Meeting

During its January meeting, the Vestry reviewed and discussed parishioner comments from the Annual Meeting on December 10, 2023. The comments stemmed from a discussion exploring the process for identifying nominees for Vestry election each year. A change to that process would require an amendment to the bylaws of Christ Church during a meeting of the whole parish. The consensus was clear that it is not the will of the parish to make that change. The bylaws call for the Vestry Nominating Committee to put forth six names to stand for election. Those names are announced three weeks before the Annual Meeting. Two weeks before the Annual Meeting, there's an opportunity for other parishioners to be nominated from the floor.

There was a desire by those at the Annual Meeting for the members of the parish to have more input in the nomination process. The Vestry will open a 30-day identification period in June for members of the parish to express their interest or to suggest someone for the Nominating Committee's consideration. The Nominating Committee will also work on a process for parishioners to get to know and interact with the nominees prior to the Annual Meeting. This was another suggestion expressed in many of the small groups during the Annual Meeting.

The Vestry Nominating Committee is made up of the four members in their final year on the Vestry and one person from each of the eight Ministry Commissions. Together, the group brainstorms a list of potential nominees and works together to decide the first six who will be asked. The Committee works its way down the list until they have six nominees. The Vestry hopes that by opening a period of parishioners self-identifying and suggesting others, the work of the Nominating Committee will be smoother than it has been.

# Documentary Screening of The Philadelphia Eleven

Watch *The Philadelphia Eleven*, a compelling new documentary film about the first women to become Episcopal priests.

In 1974, no canon specifically forbade women from becoming priests in The Episcopal Church, but diocesan standing committees and bishops to that point had almost uniformly rejected women's requests for ordination to the priesthood.

On July 29, 1974, three retired bishops agreed to ordain the 11 women, even though doing so without the approval of diocesan leadership could be seen as violating canonical law and church tradition. Church leaders debated the validity of the women's ordinations for two years until General Convention approved a new section of the church's ordination canons in September 1976 saying its provisions "shall be equally applicable to men and women."

The film shows how a brave group of women shattered the stained-glass ceiling by challenging the very core of patriarchal culture to seek ordination as priests in the Episcopal Church. It is a powerful story of faith and conviction. It is a story for all of us, regardless of faith tradition.

Their story prompts questions such as what does a just and inclusive community look like in practice? How do we break down barriers with grace and remain true to ourselves in the process? How do we, as either the protagonist or as an ally, stand up to institutions that do not allow people to be who they are called to be? How do we practice radical inclusivity?

invited them to apply to Camp Trinity. The skills and support we provide our Camp Hope families can easily be expanded to support our GIG families.

#### How can you help?

**Pray** for our campers and their families, Camp Trinity, and our ministry as we navigate this new partnership.

**Volunteer:** While we no longer need bus and camp chaperones, we are offering transportation services to our campers. Can you help transport a Camp Hope camper to Camp Trinity? Depending on their caregiver's schedule, we might also need to supervise campers before or after dropoff. Can you join us for a short pre or post-camp field trip? Please share ideas about fun activities you do near the beach or in New Bern. We also need help with administrative tasks such as contacting camp families.

**Donate Supplies:** We want our campers to be prepared for camp. Depending on their needs, we might ask for donations of camp supplies, such as bedding, towels, water shoes, etc.

**Financial Support:** Over the years, Christ Church, friends and organizations within our diocese, and Angel Tree Camping have financed our camp sessions. Until this year, Angel Tree has paid the same amount for each camper regardless of whether the incarcerated parent participated in their prison ministry program.

Going forward, Angel Tree will vary how much it will reimburse the camp depending on the child and parent's Angel Tree status. Also, Angel Tree Camping will not pay for our GIG campers. Your financial support of Camp Hope is important for continuing this ministry. Camp Hope currently has a healthy fund balance thanks to your past support.

Thank you to our Christ Church family for supporting this ministry for so many years. Many of us fondly remember attending church camp, especially Camp Trinity. We are thrilled our Camp Hope campers will make their own Camp Trinity memories this summer.

### Commissions at Christ Church

We do a lot here at Christ Church. It isn't just that it takes a lot of energy and activity to make church happen every week, but we also do a lot to serve our community, both those who are members here and those who will never enter our doors. We are serving Christ to the best of our ability. One of the ways we keep track of all of these ministries is to organize them into commissions. Commissions are groupings of committees/ministries that have similar goals. Of course, some of our ministries could easily fall into more than one commission.

Last summer the vestry began discussing our commission structure and reevaluating where each of the ministries has been grouped. Some committees no longer made sense where they were, and some needed to be moved in order to emphasize a different aspect of the ministry. Many stayed right where they were. The new commission chart indicates the organizational structure that the vestry believes works best for right now. This will be revisited periodically so we can always be sure to be open to what God is calling us to in the moment.

The commissions which have had the biggest changes are the Outreach and Evangelism commissions. Outreach is not only made up of those groups who raise money to benefit our community, but also those activities that we do as a parish to reach out to the community with a physical helping presence. Evangelism is comprised of those groups which overtly work to share God's loving presence with the community. They are very similar, but slightly different.

## Christ Church Game Night

### Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper

The season of Lent is fast approaching, beginning with Ash Wednesday on February 14th. Before we enter into this holy season of penitence, we pause to prepare ourselves. Traditionally, the period of Shrovetide was observed before Lent, often with indulgence in food items that many would abstain from during Lent



and by going to a priest for confession. The English word shrive, means to give absolution for someone's sins, thus Shrove Tuesday was named after the custom of Christians to be "shriven" before the start of Lent. The Tuesday before Ash Wednesday is the last opportunity for this to happen.
