CHRIST CHURCH IS GOING GREENER

The Church Community is beginning a process to lower our carbon footprint to the environment. This work will be an ongoing effort to consume less energy, increase our recycling efforts and reduce our waste volume. In addition, Christ Church is hoping that these efforts will extend to the homes and workplaces of everyone in the church community. Below is a list of what we are currently doing and investigating.



- Recycling of all cardboard boxes and cardboard materials.
- Recycling all metals, aluminum, and expired electronic devices.
- Recycling all worship programs, *Messengers*, and *Crown* communication papers.
- Recycling all materials that qualify (glass, cans, etc.)
- Ensure that there is NO PAPER or PLASTICS in trash cans.
- Place more recycling containers in convenient locations.
- Eliminate the use of any forms of Styrofoam.
- Limit the use of single-use plastics (when used, recycle as much as possible).
- Inspect the attics of the buildings for proper insulation. Add insulation if needed.
- Adjust the temperature of the nave when not in use.
- Turn off lights throughout the buildings when not in use.
- Investigate the possibility of placing solar panels in the flat roof areas.
- Investigate all doors and windows for proper insulation.

AROUND CHRIST CHURCH **Worship Notes**

Every week during the Prayers of the People we pray for the Universal Church, the Nation, the welfare of the world, the concerns of the local community, those who suffer, and those who have died. We pray because we believe that prayer matters. It opens us up to see God at work in the world, it points us towards ways we might be of service, and it changes something inside each of us. You may have noticed that we have added additional collects to the end of the prayers each week. Four prayers were chosen which highlight things we at Christ Church care about and have a long history of working to eradicate and/or support. We are praying for those suffering from addiction, refugees, people who find themselves trapped in poverty, and anyone suffering the violence of racism and/or oppression. These aspects of human suffering are all areas we as a church fight against in our support of MERCI Free Clinic, Religious Community Services (RCS), Interfaith Refugee Ministry (IRM), Habitat for Humanity, and Recovery Ministries of the Episcopal Church, as well as other groups working to support those who are impacted by any of these challenges. As we pray, we are changed and in turn we can be the change that the world needs.

You may have noticed that we are doing things a little differently during the services on Sunday. The person who is preaching is leading us in the Liturgy of the Word. After the peace, we transition to a different person presiding over the rest of the service, which includes the announcements and the Liturgy of the Table. Why are we doing this? It helps all of us remember the importance of connecting the sermon to the rest of the Liturgy of the Word, the Scriptures, and the prayers. It also focuses our attention as the service hinges at the peace from one focal point, the Word, to another focal point, the Table. It also means you get to hear multiple voices throughout the service, which hopefully helps each of us stay engaged.

HURRICANE DISASTER RELIEF

From Episcopal Relief and Development: We are partnering with dioceses in Florida, as well as reaching out to other impacted communities in lan's path up the southern Atlantic coast and the Caribbean, who are determining what their communities need, both in the immediate future and down the road for a sustained recovery. Help Christ Church Help Those In Need

The Episcopal Church has been actively concerned with the rights of refugees and migrants since the United States opened its borders to the first waves of immigrants from war-torn countries in the 1930s. Episcopal Migration Ministries traces its origin to this time, when the Episcopal Church began to advocate for migrants and to raise money to purchase steamship passage for refugees fleeing Nazi Europe. In the decades since, the Episcopal Church has been involved in direct service, community organizing, and public policy advocacy for the rights of voluntary migrants and immigrants, as well as forcibly displaced refugees, asylum seekers, and other populations. Interfaith Refugee Ministry is an organization that directly supports the mission and ministry of Episcopal Migration Ministries.

Interfaith Refugee Ministry is dedicated to helping refugees rebuild their lives in eastern North Carolina. They aid refugees with basic necessities when they first arrive in New Bern and surrounding areas. This includes, but is not limited to, assistance with housing, food, clothing, employment, learning English, and cultural orientation. The ultimate goal is to help refugees become self-reliant, emotionally secure, and culturally adjusted in their new home. Each year, Interfaith Refugee Ministry resettles new refugee families from around the world. They try to provide a bridge for persecuted people who are coming out of the darkness of a shattered life into the bright hope of a better future.

Christ Church has helped support the work of Interfaith Refugee Ministry financially as well as through volunteer efforts of various kinds over the years. The impact of the COVID pandemic on Christ Church's involvement with this outreach effort has been significant. We are attempting to rebuild and would like to compile a list of those interested in helping out by supporting refugee families. If you would like to assist with this ministry once in a while or on an ongoing basis - and would be willing to be added to our list please get in touch with Suzanne (suzannehood@christchurchnewbern.com; 252-631-5862). Our hope is to have a list of thirty to fifty people we could call when we are ready to take on a new initiative with IRM. We would call to see if you could help this time with a specific task. The more people we have who are interested in helping, the less responsibility falls to any one person. Please consider adding your name to the list and helping with this important ministry.

Fall Rothermel Lecture

The fall lecture of the Rothermel Fund will take place next Sunday, October 16 at 2 pm in the sanctuary of First Presbyterian Church. Dr. Stanley Riggs, Research Professor of Geology at ECU will speak on Sea Level Change in ENC: Past, Present and Predicted.

Over the past 125,000 years, sea level changed from about 25 feet above presently to about 400 feet below, beginning a continuing rise from that nadir 15,000 years ago. Since the early 1700's sea level has been documented rising at an increasing rate marked by incidences of coastal flooding.

Professor Riggs posits there will always be a coastal Carolina, just not where it is today. Attend the lecture to learn more of past, present predicted sea levels and consequences of living at the coast. For additional information about the lecture, contact Ann Bustard at 252-636-2885.

Visit the Richard Dobbs Spaight Interpretive Sign

The Richard Dobbs Spaight Chapter's Preservation Committee met its long-term goal to have an interpretive sign recognizing this famous New Bernian -- who was a Revolutionary War Patriot, signer of the US Constitution, first native-born governor of North Carolina, Statesman and New Bern native -- erected in a highly visual location that the public could easily read and become aware of his service to our country.

The occasion chosen for the unveiling was during Constitution Week - September 17-23. Our Richard Dobbs Spaight Chapter and Sons of the American Revolution Chapter unveiled the new interpretive sign in the historic churchyard of Christ Church. This site was chosen for its visibility and the fact that Spaight was a member of Christ Church and had served on the Vestry. Following the unveiling, churches throughout the community participated in the "Ringing of the Bells" at 4 pm, which commemorated the time on September 17, 1787, the delegates to the Constitutional Convention, including Richard Dobbs Spaight, met for the last time to sign the document they created. Mortally wounded in a duel, he was buried in his family's sepulcher at Clermont, and his property was bequeathed to the state of NC as part of Tryon Palace to insure this historic property is preserved for perpetuity.

Of note, the actual initiative to have President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Congress officially proclaimed September 17-23 as Constitution Week was led by Gertrude Carraway of New Bern, a member of the Richard Dobbs Spaight Chapter and President General of the National Society of the DAR.
