Diocesan Convention Wrap Up

Christ Church was well represented at the 140th Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina in Greenville last weekend. Our five lay delegates and three clergy delegates were joined by other Christ Church members on the East Carolina Youth Council and folks who are part of ministries like Interfaith Refugee Ministry, Episcopal Farm Worker Ministry, and the Racial Healing Commission. Baker Hudson and Lauren Simmons served as acolytes during Friday's Eucharist. Alison Ezell served as our Youth Representative, and Tayleigh Carpenter, an 11th grader, was one of our voting delegates. 

What to Expect in Lent

At Christ Church, we tend to shift what we do in worship each liturgical season. The season of Lent calls us to an even more intentional time of reflection, prayer, and study.

During the season of Lent, we encourage you to enter worship in silence and to remain quiet until the service begins. Silence allows us to center ourselves and prepare to meet with God. Silence calls us out of the noise of the world and acts as a threshold into the holy space of worship. Silence molds us into an attitude of humility before our Creator — being slow to speak and quick to listen. You might encounter reminders that say:

Before the Service, speak to the Lord. During the Service, let the Lord speak to you. After the Service, speak to one another.

As a means of having uninterrupted worship, we will make announcements at the beginning of the service, before the opening hymn. At both 8:30 and 11:00, we will open our time of worship with Penitential Order (found on p. 351 in the Book of Common Prayer). Using this, we say the confession of sin as our opening act of worship. We use a shorter musical piece in place of the Song of Praise. The words will remind us of God's mercy and our dependance on God in what we do in our lives. Since we will have said the Confession earlier, we pass the peace immediately after the Prayers of the People. At both services, we will speak the Sanctus (Holy, holy, holy) at the Eucharist. We also replace the blessing at the end of the liturgy with a solemn prayer.

We hope you will join us each week in Lent as we journey with Christ through the wilderness and towards the cross and empty tomb.

LENT MADNESS

Don't forget about Lent Madness. It's a daily match-up of 32 saints throughout Lent. The format is straightforward: 32 saints are placed into a tournament-like single elimination bracket. Each pairing remains open for a set period of time, and people vote for their favorite saint. Sixteen saints make it to the Round of the Saintly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted Golden Halo.

Learn more about Lent Madness and fill out the bracket at https://www.lentmadness.org/ (very similar to a March Madness bracket), to vote on your favorite. You can sign up to get the daily emails or go to the website each day to vote. There's a lot of people who have voted for saints in the past. Check in with people during Coffee Hour to see how their saints have fared.


CATECHETICAL SERIES

Just as the infancy narratives, where we tend to mash up the storied in Matthew and Luke into one big Christmas Story, we do the same with the Passion, Death, and Resurrection narratives in the 4 canonical Gospels. What can we learn if we examine each Gospel without "knowledge" of the other three? How does the story evolve over time? What is the difference between the Jesus of Mark's Passion to the Jesus of John's Passion. Are there liturgical elements imbedded in the narratives? How is the Resurrection handled? How can we grow our faith today with a deeper understanding?

Women of Christ Church, are you looking for a spiritual community in a busy world where women with similar interests can pray, study, share together, and affirm and support each other?





The Epiphany Chapter of The Order of the Daughters of the King would like to extend an invitation

Coming Soon... Episcopal Farmworker Ministry Drive

Our active support for 2023 will begin in March with a drive for specified food and toiletry items as contributions for the thousands of migrant farmworkers who will begin arriving in April. We are now able to re-invigorate our yearly help interrupted by COVID from 2020-2022.

Farmworkers provide the fruits and vegetables we depend upon at a cost we can afford. They earn less than half a minimum wage, are separated from their families, have social security taken out and are ineligible for most benefits our levels of government provide its citizens.

The Farmworker Ministry was initiated in 1982 by the Dioceses of East and North Carolina. It has been actively supported by Christ Church members and donations since its inception. More than 10,000 farmworkers are touched by this ministry through advocacy, visits to worker camps, translation of documents, emergency assistance, referrals to legal and medical visits, an annual festival, and donations of food, clothing, blankets, heaters, fans and other essentials.
