## A Moment with Stewardship

Writing these weekly stewardship articles has been a labor of love. What started out as a leap of faith last year, has become a lesson in faith ever since. Drawing from many sources, I've been blessed to grow in love and faith and to find fellowship with members of Christ Church who have now become family.



The inspiration for this article comes from listening to the wonderful, heartfelt "Stewardship Moment" speakers in our congregation who spoke on why they serve and why they give. The idea of belonging to a community of faith has been a recurring theme and reminded me of the "Sermon of the Dying Ember" (author unknown).

A member of a certain church, who previously had been attending services regularly, stopped going. After a few weeks, the pastor decided to visit him. It was a chilly evening. The pastor found the man at home alone, sitting before a blazing fire.

Guessing the reason for his pastor's visit, the man welcomed him, led him to a big chair near the fireplace and waited. The pastor made himself comfortable but said nothing. In the grave silence, he contemplated the play of the flames around the burning logs.

After some minutes, the pastor took the fire tongs, carefully picked up a brightly burning ember and placed it to one side of the hearth all alone. Then he sat back in his chair, still silent. The host watched all this in quiet fascination.

As the one lone ember's flame diminished, there was a mo-

mentary glow and then its fire was no more. Soon it was cold and "dead as a doornail." Not a word had been spoken since the initial greeting.

Just before the pastor was ready to leave, he picked up the cold, dead ember and placed it back in the middle of the fire. Immediately it began to glow once more with the light and warmth of the burning coals around it.

As the pastor reached the door to leave, his host said, "Thank you so much for your visit and especially for the fiery sermon. I shall be back in church next Sunday."

Dear Lord, as we gather at Christ Church, help us remember that each of us is an ember glowing with others "with the light and warmth" of a Christian community. We are grateful for opportunities to be with others who share our faith and our love for Jesus, and we pledge to do our best to keep that fire burning in our church and in our hearts. Help us to always cast that light and warmth outward to the glory of Your Holy Name. Amen

# Personal Stories of Stewardship

### Elizabeth Livingston

When I began writing what I wanted to say it started pretty much the same way I always talk about my life: cradle Episcopalian, preacher's kid, a life of faith, doubt, searching, more questions than answers. A life filled with love, joy, tragedy, heartache, loss, triumph... always a resurrection/transformation story. And as I began to really ask myself the question about tithing, my shift focused -- as has my relationship with what it means to tithe -- not just give or donate, but tithe.

As I thought about my history of giving, service, stewardship, of course I can't help but look at my upbringing. I was modeled a life of service, an abundance mentality, and the idea that this is all God's anyway so of "thine own have we given thee". I must admit though that for much of my relationship with the tithing part of that equation, I was probably motivated more by duty than my actual relationship with God. Let me try to explain, I grew up with all the same scriptural references we are all familiar with. And in truth they have been my experience, in giving I receive, the blessings multiply, when I faithfully tithe it feels better, I am doing the right thing. Giving from a place of gratitude and thanksgiving are joyful and in line with my desire to keep an abundance mentality.

If I am honest though, I have to explore more deeply what it is about tithing that is different than just trying to be a good person and doing the right thing and donating money to great causes. Donating my time, money or talent still has me a little bit in control.

Tithing isn't just about my relationship with money, it's about my relationship with God. Do I trust God to be in control? Well at this point in my life I clearly know I'm not, but that doesn't mean that I don't still think I might do it better. Tithing helps break down my ego's thought that "I am in charge." It challenges me to ask the question, "Where does my security come from -- money or my relationship with God? Tithing is a complete letting go of control. Tithing is a way to bring God into my relationship with money.

For me Tithing is saying "This is God's money," and it isn't about how much I have. It's about giving back a 10% tithe from whatever that amount is. I'm sure when I had a smaller income 10% might seem like too much, and I'm sure I thought those making plenty of money should have no trouble giving more. That probably says as much about my "oh yee of little faith" because truth is it none of that is my business. I read recently that if we aren't a little beyond our present faith when we tithe, we ought to tithe more. My challenge was -- and is -- to gather my courage and plunge in, trusting that God will provide. I have had enough practice now to assure you that They will. Tithing for me has activated a subtle connection between my faith and the flow of God's blessings in my life. And I am not talking about monetary blessings, although I have had more than my share. I am talking about recognizing the blessings everywhere in my life and the abundance of God's love for everything, all of it, on this fragile earthly home we are all just passing through. And that is the greatest blessing of all.

- -- Endowment Board (one position, four years; meets quarterly to review the current assets in the Endowment and to review how those funds are allocated; a background in investing is very helpful)
- -- Finance Committee (Two positions, three years; meets monthly to review the parish's financial position; serves an advisory role to the Vestry) NOTE: Previous Finance Committee members must have been off the FC for two years before being re-appointed by the Vestry.
- -- Diocesan Convention Delegate (Diocesan Convention is in Greenville, February 9-10, 2024)
- -- Two positions, three years (must have been off for two years before re-appointment); Two alternates, one year -- Personnel Committee (Two positions, three years; one position, one-year; meets periodically to review policy and procedure and job descriptions)
